Throughout the second half of 2015, GCNF undertook a strategic planning process, which involved structured interviews with some 48 stakeholders around the world working in one or more of the interrelated fields of school meals, nutrition, agriculture, local purchasing, etc. The interviewees included policy makers, donors, practitioners, advocates, researchers, and GCNF Board members. Each was asked to rate different strategic options in five categories on two levels: a) the importance of the topic in general, and b) the level of priority the topic should have for GCNF going forward. The five categories were:

Thematic focus (The strategic options in this category were food safety, local purchase/ agricultural development, job and profit creation, nutrition, obesity prevention and control, and early childhood development)

- 2) Value added (objective broker, clearinghouse, database/network for expertise and talent, linking agricultural development to school meals and nutrition, and developing research questions)
- 3) Means of intervention (technical assistance: knowledge dissemination; policy, standards, and best practice development; and cross learning)
- 4) Services and products (the GCN Forum; capacity building, training, and certification; technical assistance provider: technical facilitation/matchmaker; and products such as apps, toolkits, and food or other products 5) Geographic focus (Africa, South/Central Asia, Latin America, and "opportunistic")

The ratings were compiled into a report for the December 8 GCNF Board meeting and served as the basis for the Board members' discussion and decisions regarding priorities for GCNF going forward. Continued on Page 4

Mr. Buffett serves as an Auxiliary Deputy Sheriff and Undersheriff in Macon County, Ill. He has traveled to more than 140 countries and authored eight books on conservation, wildlife, and the human condition, including the New York Times bestseller 40 Chances: Finding Hope in a Hungry World. Mr. Buffett is the executive producer of Virunga, an award-winning and Academy Award-nominated documentary about Africa's oldest national park.

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start small dairy herds and industries to provide milk for school meals. In the schools, they worked with teachers and parents to promote nutrition education and support for community based school

feeding programs.

A SCHOOL NUTRITION CHAMPION RETIRES— PENNY McConnell

How times have changed since Penny McConnell, MS, RDN, SNS, embarked upon a career in school nutrition. A lifetime of championing the importance of school meals and nutrition education sets McConnell apart as one of the profession's most distinguished leaders — and the recipient of the 2015 Marjorie Hulsizer Copher Award.

"Back in 1965, school lunch costs 25 cents, I made \$400 monthly without benefits, the federal regulations were new, kids drank whole milk, they had one meal choice, there were no special diets and we had to do everything by hand or from scratch and find creative ways to use commodities like 50 pound blocks of butter - all while being financially solvent," says McConnell. "It was fun, rewarding, challenging and I never stopped learning, which is why I stayed for 50 years."

Recently retired as director of food and nutrition services for Fairfax County Public Schools in Virginia, McConnell oversaw a \$95 million budget, 1,400 employees and 185,000 students in the nation's 11th largest school district. An early adopter of innovation, she used technology to streamline communications. "I welcomed the challenge and opportunity to use technology to centralize operations and communicate more effectively," says McConnell, adding that this allowed her staff to spend more time educating kids about nutrition.

With an unwavering focus on the growth and well-being of children, McConnell put their needs above all else. "'Talk, serve and teach nutrition' was my goal, with the hopes of sowing the seeds of good nutrition in children that would continue into adulthood and maybe even spurn a career in dietetics," says McConnell.

A respected expert, she used her influence to advocate for feeding programs nationally and globally, especially for the underserved. McConnell authored more than 50 publications, and in 2008, she codeveloped a School Feeding Toolkit, which — now in its third edition — is used internationally by the Global Child



Nutrition Foundation. McConnell's commitment to dietetics extends beyond school nutrition, and she has held more than 60 elected positions in the Academy, School Nutrition Association and the GCNF. In addition, she has served as a preceptor and mentor to many RDNs. "Everyone needs a mentor," she says. "It has been such a pleasure mentoring young dietitians, encouraging them to consider food service management, get involved with our profession, and stay up to date so they can become lighthouses — shining the way for our future."

CELEBRATE 4th INTERNATIONAL SCHOOL MEALS DAY MARCH 3, 2016



The concept of International School Meals Day (ISMD) emerged from collaboration between USDA's Food and Nutrition Service and its counterpart in the United Kingdom; the two nations have been engaged in an exchange of practices and lessons learned in the area of food and nutrition policy in schools. Among the intended purposes of ISMD is to raise awareness of the importance of food and nutrition to education and to share school feeding experiences from around the globe.

The ISMD draws attention to the importance of school meal programs around the globe, both in developing and developed countries. One of the primary goals of ISMD is to connect children around the world to foster healthy eating

habits, raise awareness of differences and shared values, and promote well-being in schools (support a platform for global learning on food via suitable media)

The 2016 International School Meals Day will be March 3rd, 2016. We encourage children and young people of the world (with support from their teachers) to connect and talk to each other and share their food experiences, stories and news about food and the part it plays in their lives using the

theme Fresh and Healthy Local Foods. Many schools have farm to school programs, or have school and community gardens that support nutrition education and healthy eating.

Local farmers play a huge role in strengthening local economies and contributing to vibrant communities around the world. Farm to School programmes and projects support public health aims by providing local healthy food. The use of school and community gardens can contribute to healthy neighbourhoods where communities have a better understanding of how food is grown and how food affects their health and wellbeing.

It is up to each individual country, school and classroom to take part and work together to make the day fun and make nutrition a staple of

the education calendar throughout the year; celebrating the wonder of food and raising awareness of the importance of healthy eating patterns among school age children. Food and nutrition can be integrated into all subject matter. Please visit
