The Global Survey of School Meal Programs © fills a void by establishing the first global database of school meal programs that gathers standardized information across all countries.

Key Findings



School meals are an investment in human capital.

Countries make transformative human capital investments, ensuring children are well-nourished and ready to learn, and are able to fulfill their potential as healthy, skilled, productive adults.



School meals can transform the food system.

School meal programs can be leveraged to transform food systems to increase the availability of nutritious, safe, sustainably produced, and affordable foods that prioritizes child nutrition.

Harnessing this **buying power** could have a powerful and positive effect on both national and global food systems.

Across the 85 countries surveyed, an estimated **297.3 million children of all ages** received food through school meal programs in the previously completed school year.

Key Findings



School meals provide and promote nutrition.

Investing in a child's nutrition beyond the first 1,000 days to the first 8,000 days of life is critical for establishing lifelong health and full future potential. School feeding is a powerful tool to meet the nutritional needs of children and adolescents.



School meals strengthen local agriculture and drive inclusive economic growth.

School meal programs provide an opportunity to expand local agricultural economies, support resilience in local supply chains, create jobs, and economically empower women and youth.



IMPROVING NUTRITION WITH SCHOOL MENU DIVERSITY

Programs that rely on domestic purchase strengthen local agricultural development and more commonly report diverse and nutritious food items.
