The **Global Survey of School Meal Programs** ② aims to strengthen the work of the global school meal network by developing a comprehensive description of all the core aspects of large-scale school meal programs around the world.

School Meals in South Asia, East Asia, and the Pacific at a Glance



180.1 million children were fed by school meals. **34%** of primary school-age children were fed and **13%** of secondary school-age children were fed.



79% of countries had a national school feeding policy.



\$14.5 billion USD was allocated to school meal programs. **74%** of countries had a national budget line item dedicated to school feeding.



96% of countries purchased at least some food from domestic sources.

School Meal Programs in Action

- In Cambodia, families and communities contributed to building kitchens and storage rooms for school canteens.
- **Bhutan** utilized open-bid procedures to engage small-scale farmers in food procurement and also provided them with forward contracts.
- → In **New Zealand,** the school meal program maintained a purposeful focus on creating jobs or income-generating opportunities for Iwi and Hapūūu (Indigenous Māori tribes)
- In Japan, procurement is conducted at a local level allowing for the support of small-scale farmers and strengthening of the local economy.

Ensuring Healthy Diets & Food Systems

92% of programs had an **objective to meet nutritional and/or health goals**. On average, school meal programs in South Asia, East Asia, and the Pacific served foods from **8 healthy food categories**, compared to the **global average of 6.8 healthy food categories**.

Home-Grown School Feeding (HGSF) Indicators

HGSF enhances food diversity and strengthens local food systems.

54% of programs in South Asia, East Asia, and the Pacific exhibited 4 or more HGSF indicators, compared to the global average of 47%. 92% Purchase domestically
